Work on new building underway

It's exciting times at the Nelson Tasman Hospice as work has started on the new building site in Suffolk Road, Stoke with completion due at the end of 2018.

It's the biggest project the hospice has embarked upon in its 30-year history.

Plans for the building had been drawn up because the hospice had reached an important crossroad in the free service provided to the community across the region.

We needed a new home on a new site and there are four interconnected reasons for this.

• It is a well known statistic that people are living longer. We are already providing services to an

ever growing number of senior citizens. The numbers will only get bigger.

• We also wish to respond to meet our community's growing and changing needs in the 21st century. Our services are increasingly for all age groups and diverse circumstances.

• We need a new home, with all our facilities on one site, including better configurations of patients' rooms, better provision for our significant outreach service, better space for families, better space for staff and volunteers.

• We have been asked to leave our current site because of the anticipated growth of the Manuka Street private hospital facilities.

So it is time for a new home for an integrated hospice service, under one roof. The total estimated cost of the new home for hospice is \$11.5 million.

The hospice is contributing \$7.5 million to the project and that leaves \$1.5 million to raise through grants and in-kind donations on the build and \$2.5 million from the community.

We have received two significant grants

- \$556,366 from Pub Charity and \$250,000 from the Rata Foundation for which we are extremely grateful.

The money from the community is expected to be raised through naming rights and other significant giving, events, auctions and donations.

We need the public's help to raise the rest of the funds for this community project.

We appreciate the amount of support that has been given to the hospice. Without it we would not be able to provide the level of service we do.

Hospice welcomes palliative medicine specialist

Nelson Tasman Hospice's first palliative medicine specialist Dr Jodie Battley says hospice is becoming involved with patients much earlier in their end-of-life journey.

That allows staff to build relationships with patients and their families.

"The big message is that we can help you live well with limited time, it's all about guality of life."

Jodie intends to focus on developing the service in the community and visiting rural clinics. She also hopes to implement a consult-based service at Nelson Hospital.

Jodie says the research shows that early integration of palliative care with oncology and other services means better outcomes for people.

"These patients do better in terms

of quality of life, symptom control and satisfaction with their care."

She says her role is to develop the "excellent team" into a specialist service with a variety of functions, including providing education and support to GPs, hospital specialists and aged care facilities.

Born and raised in New Zealand, Jodie studied at Otago Medical School and worked in Ireland for 10 years, first in oncology before specialising in palliative medicine in 2016.

The specialty interested her because of its potential.

"I think it was seeing what is possible and knowing that just because a person has a diagnosis that is going to shorten their life, doesn't necessarily mean it defines them."

The most enjoyable part of her role is

the chance to work with patients and their families.

Specialist palliative care is increasingly in demand, she says.

"Our referrals here have gone up by 28 per cent in the last four years so that really shows that we are increasingly needed but also the great faith that the community has in hospice."

With the new hospice building, the service is about to undergo a significant change.

"We are on the verge of something really exciting moving to the new unit, it is a great time to be involved in that change and drive other potential areas of development."

New general manager for hospice shops

The hospice shops' new general manager is using his corporate world experience to help keep the stores vibrant, well-stocked, great places to nab a bargain.

Brad Turner, who has a background in retail business consultancy, took over the role in July, after Karen Mackenzie-Howe took a step back to focus on managing the Richmond store.

Brad, 32, says he is still learning the business.

"I'm really in a stage of discovery at the moment. I'm learning from the store managers."

He says the second-hand business is very competitive.

"Within Richmond, for instance, there are six to eight other second-hand stores. So it's about branding and it's about quality. We sort very carefully."

Brad has registered the Motueka and Takaka stores with Google (Nelson and

Richmond stores were already registered, thanks to a volunteer) which means customers can find the stores online, can get



directions and give feedback.

Computers have also been installed at all shops, so that staff can do their own printing, email and so on. "In this day and age, it's such an important thing," Brad says.

The Queen Street upgrade in Richmond has been a big challenge to the store there with decreased foot traffic and general access. "Any donations or support we can have - in any stores would be great - but particularly in Richmond it would be a big boost," Brad says.

Outside of this half-time role, Brad also runs a B&B with his wife, five-year-old daughter and twin four-year-old boys in Motueka and occasionally works at a sawmill.

He says it's been a positive move for him to start working within an organisation that cares for its people - staff, volunteers and patients.



Hospice 'life-changing' for Andy Pui

Andy Pui lived with ill health for years after being diagnosed with rheumatic fever. As his condition became terminal, the hospital told him there was little more they could do.

So in March, he visited the Nelson Tasman Hospice for the first time. He said the experience was "life-changing".

"I should have came in here a long time ago, maybe I wouldn't be so worn out."

Pui, 54, said he had been unwell for most of his life. Alongside the rheumatic fever, he had lost a leg and had open heart surgery.

His other organs including his kidney, liver and lungs had begun to fail due to the strain on his heart.

He said it had been frustrating going to different places and not getting the right support or medication, but that changed when he engaged with hospice.

Pui is visited at home twice a week by community nurses and also stayed at the hospice for respite care. It means his visits to hospital are less frequent.

"You just need that little bit more support so you don't get sick again so quick."

Pui and his partner Anna Henare have five kids between them. The youngest, Morehu, is eight years old. He was thankful hospice care extended to his family as it allowed them to spend quality time together, to have discussions about the future and share meals

here," Morehu said. "I like how there is yummy chocolate cake and creamed porridge."
