

Palliative Care Consult Services Hospital Liaison and Aged Residential Care





New Zealanders are living longer, and our population is aging which presents many challenges to the healthcare sectors. Population projections show that while there are currently about 842,000 people aged 65 or over, this number will continue to increase over the next 50 years. This equates to approx. 80 people per day. The number of people in these older ages is estimated to reach 1.3 million around 2040, and 1.5 million by the 2050s (Statistics New Zealand, 2022).

A dedicated palliative care interdisciplinary team (IDT), work alongside staff at Te Whatu Ora Nelson Marlborough and in Aged Residential Care (ARC) to provide a consultancy service to support the delivery of specialist palliative care, for all inpatients and residents.

The Education Team can support the IDT by providing opportunities for palliative care education to build knowledge, to enhance skills and confidence for those providing care to persons with a life limiting illness.

Community Engagement Building Compassionate Communities





While compassionate communities are diverse and locally responsive, the fundamental underpinnings remain common. Compassionate communities involve the activation of community members to care for each other. Compassionate communities draw on community strengths, resources, and understanding about death and dying to provide care and support to those nearing the end of life.

Nelson Tasman Hospice is dedicated to working with a diverse range of communities. Building compassionate communities and social networks that assists patients and families/whānau to care for their loved ones in a variety of settings, in the hospice, in hospital in aged residential care (ARC) or at home.

We provide palliative care and end of life education to health professionals and community workers and are keen to engage with grassroots communities to demystify death and dying.

Our education team with the support of our volunteer and interdisciplinary teams can work with you to facilitate conversations, co design workshops or seminars, to meet your needs using a range of approaches.

Syringe Driver Workshops for Registered Nurses, EN's, Aged Residential Care & District Nurses

The programme assists Registered Nurses (RNs) and Enrolled Nurses (ENs) working in Aged Residential Care (ARC) and District Nursing (DNs) to obtain the skills and knowledge required to manage a syringe driver in their work setting. About the Knowledge Hub

Knowledge Hub is brought to you by Te Kahu Pairuri o Aotearoa Hospice New Zealand. Its aim is to provide health professionals and carers with education and resources to enable the provision of skilled and competent palliative care.

About the Fundamentals of Palliative Care Programme

The Fundamentals programme will give you an overview of how to care for people with palliative care needs in your role as a healthcare worker. Being educated about palliative care will help you improve the assessment and outcomes for people in your care, their family and whānau, as well as yourself and other healthcare workers.

There are four topics:

Essence

Essence focuses on what palliative care is, who is involved and cultural considerations. It will help you understand the essence and principles of palliative care and what you need to be prepared for when caring for people in New Zealand at the end of life.

The palliative care approach

This topic focuses on the palliative care approach and how understanding ethics, communication and spirituality can help you improve as a healthcare worker and support those receiving care.

Managing pain and long-term illness

Managing pain and long-term illness is split into two subtopics: In Pain, other symptoms and pharmacology, you will learn the basics of pharmacology, and how you can recognise pain and help people and their family and whānau through it. In Chronic illness and dementia, you will learn how to recognise chronic illness and dementia, the challenges that people diagnosed with these face, and how you can support them.

Care and support at the end of life

Care and support at the end of life is about last days of life, loss, and grief, with a focus on how to care for everyone and support people in care and their family/whānau.



Supporting Psychological Needs in Palliative care





Identifying, treating, and managing the psychological needs of patients and their family/ whānau is a key element in the provision of palliative care.

The accurate diagnosis and treatment of psychological symptoms can help patients and their family/ whānau engage more meaningfully in their lives, including participating in decision making about their care.

This forum will explore:

- Developing an understanding of a basic theory of human psychology (Maslow's Hierarchy of needs)
- Models Cognitive Behavioural Model/Stress Appraisal and Coping Model of psychological distress in those with life limiting illnesses
- Identify types of psychological distress when faced with a life limiting illness Grief and loss, rumination (Generalised Anxiety Disorder), Panic Disorder, Depression, PTSD/Trauma, exacerbation of pre-existing mental health needs (Bipolar, Psychosis)
- Exploring methods of supporting the psychological needs of patients and carers using an evidenced based approach – CBT, ACT, Trauma Informed Care
- Case study application.

Supporting Carer Needs in Palliative Care



Most people living with a life limiting will need the assistance of a non-professional carer such as a family member, friend, or neighbour to provide physical, emotional, and practical caring supports. A significant portion of these support people can feel overwhelmed, isolated and experience psychological and/or financial distress. Carers do have unmet needs, information changes throughout the illness journey.

Palliative care recognises the needs of carers/support people is as important as those of the person living with a life limiting illness.

Health care providers need to have the knowledge and skills to provide practical information to assist the carer/support person to meet the holistic needs of their loved one, in the last months/weeks/days of life, and to instil confidence and knowledge so they know what to expect.

- What does the research say about carer needs?
- How to support caregiver resilience
- Supporting emotional and psychological needs
- What local resources are available to support financial and social needs?

- Holistic symptom management-pharmacological and non-pharmacological

Supporting Rural Communities in Palliative Care





It is well recognised there is inconsistent provision of palliative and end-of-life care across New Zealand, particularly in rural and remote areas. Palliative care improves quality of life and the experience of dying, and all people should have equitable access to quality needs-based care as they approach and reach the end of their lives. A palliative approach to care is crucial in rural New Zealand where there is a reliance for such care on generalist providers amid the challenges of a limited workforce, poorer access, and vast geography.

Providing palliative care (PC) in rural settings is challenging due to limitations on training, staff, resources, and funding. Rural populations tend to be older, have higher mortality, more likely to suffer from a chronic condition, physical disability and be of lower socioeconomic status than those in urban areas.

This forum will explore:

- What does the research say about the palliative care needs of those in rural settings?
- What are the challenges of palliative care provision in palliative care?
- What are the strengths of rural communities and building a compassionate community?
- Models and guidance for how best to provide PC in rural settings
- How to communicate effectively with rural communities
- How to provide practical carer support with limited resources
